

Noted critical care expert, Dr. Thomas Ahrens is a Research Scientist at Barnes Jewish Hospital in St. Louis. Dr. Ahrens lectures both nationally and internationally on critical care topics such as cost control strategies for critical care. Dr. Ahrens is a respected author of five books and over 100 papers. He is recipient of the 1999 Society of Critical Care Medicine Presidential Citation award and the 1999 American Association of Critical Care Nurses research award for work on ICU sedation management. From 2006-2008 he was AACN's representative to the Surviving Sepsis Campaign. In 2008 he was presented with the "Flame of Excellence" award from the American Association of Critical Care Nurses for sustained and influential work in critical care.



A widely recognized authority in critical care education, Dr. Robert Taylor has over 20 years in critical care practice and directed physician critical care education programs. In addition to focusing on educational methods in critical care, he is extensively published in the areas of respiratory failure and hemodynamic monitoring. Dr. Taylor is a Clinical Professor and Director of the Critical Care Residency Program at St. Louis University and St. John's Mercy Medical Center. He is a past president of the Society of Critical Care Medicine and has served on their governing council for the past decade. His primary focus is quality improvement in critical care.



Dr. Frank Miller is professor and former chair of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at the University of Kentucky College of Medicine. He has served as president of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, Society of Perinatal Obstetricians, and the Association of Professors of Gynecology and Obstetrics. He is board-certified in obstetrics and gynecology, with a subspecialty in maternal-fetal medicine. Dr. Miller is extensively published and currently an editorial consultant for ACOG's Obstetrics & Gynecology and the American Journal of Obstetrics and Gynecology. Internationally recognized, Dr. Miller is an honorary member of the Society of Obstetricians and Gynecologists of Canada, and Fellow and Eundum of the Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists in the United Kingdom.



Dr. David Miller is professor of Obstetrics, Gynecology and Pediatrics at the University of Southern California School of Medicine. He is Director of Maternal-Fetal Medicine, Chairman of Graduate Medical Education and Director of USC Obstetrics and Gynecology Residency Program at Hollywood Presbyterian Medical Center in Los Angeles. Dr. Miller currently serves as Medical Director of the Children's Hospital Los Angeles-University of Southern California Institute for Maternal Fetal Health. Board-certified in obstetrics and gynecology, with a subspecialty in maternal-fetal medicine, Dr. Miller's research interests include antepartum and intrapartum fetal evaluation with emphasis on fetal physiology and effective, standardized methods of education in electronic fetal monitoring. He received the APGO-CREOG National Faculty Teaching Award in 2006. Dr. Miller has published extensively and is a joint author of the book "Mosby's Pocket Guide to Fetal Monitoring: A Multidisciplinary Approach".
